Both old and new, traditional and innovative, popular and elite, mainstream and esoteric, escapist and engaged, high-tech and anti-technology, fantasy defies definitions and transcends categories, dramatizing the incompleteness of our understanding of our own imaginations. At Mythcon 45 we will discuss the place of fantasy in our culture, our institutions, and our hearts.

CHECK IN AND CHECK OUT PROCEDURES for WHEATON COLLEGE

Reminder Deadline for Room & Board packages is July 24.

Early check-in on Thursday will start formally at 8 p.m. in the **Keefe Hall** dormitory lobby on Wheaton campus. If you plan to arrive earlier than 8 p.m. please e-mail Michael Drout at mdrout@wheatoncollege.edu to let him know your approximate arrival time so that you may be properly received. Early check in will continue in the Keefe lobby over night until 8:00 a.m. Friday morning when normal check-in will start in the **Davis Spencer Cafe** in the **Mars Center for Science and Technology**, available until Sunday morning (#42 & #29, please see the map).

Key Deposit: Upon checking in, each guest must provide a key deposit of \$85, payable in the form of cash or check addressed to "Wheaton College." Deposits will be sealed in an envelope and returned to guests upon return of the key.

Guests must check out by 1 p.m. Monday in the **Davis Spencer Cafe**. Please remember Monday breakfast is the last meal provided; however the café in the Balfour-Hood Campus Center will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

GETTING AROUND WHEATON COLLEGE

Wheaton College is a relatively small college campus; however, we hope to provide our guests with maximum ease of navigation in and around campus.

Please note that open trenches or other infrasctructure work may be going on and conference attendees need to be cautious when walking through such areas.

ON CAMPUS

Wheaton College Campus Map can be found online to help guests locate proper parking areas and the check in location as well as the dorms where guests are staying; it is also included at the end of this Progress Report. Please note: **Keefe Hall** is #42 on the map, highlighted with a red circle. The **Davis Spencer Cafe** is #29, highlighted with a green circle; **Mythcon 45 registration**, programming, and normal Wheaton check-in take place there.

ACCESSING GUEST WIFI

Guest wifi is available for all users on campus in the open, unencryted network named Guest. To login to the Guest wifi network, simply select the Guest network under your computer's Wireless Network Connection and enter the following registration password (all lowercase, no spaces): summer2014. This password will be valid throughout the conference.

PARKING & UNLOADING

On Friday during normal check-in conferees should park in Lot 8 first, check-in at the Davis Spencer Cafe in the Science Center, then go to their dorms (Beard, Gebbie, or Keefe) to avoid traffic congestion in the Keefe/Gebbie Circle. The Science Center isn't far from the dorms and has elevators for those who need them. Free parking is available in Lot 8 and Lot 4 (the Meadows Lot); on Friday Lot 8 might still be a bit full from staff & guests that are leaving so the Meadows Lot is a good back up until Lot 8 clears. We can use Lot 9 but it will most likely be full of staff.

THURSDAY ARRIVALS

For Mythcon guests arriving on Thursday, a list of restaurants around campus has been compiled, including information about distance from campus, food price ranges, phone numbers, and availability of delivery; this can be found at the back of this Progress Report.

Note: alcohol cannot be consumed on campus except inside formally approved spaces: the banquet setting; the private "hospitality" space; private rooms. Alcohol may not be carried in open containers on campus.

WEATHER EXPECTATIONS

Average August temperatures in Norton are low-80s. Expect mosquitoes in the evening (Golfimbul, hello!) so remember to bring and use insect repellent) - there may even be a little rain.

PROGRAMMING

Mythcon 45 has a full complement of individual presenters and multi-speaker discussion panels. Panels include:

How does fantasy "fit" with faith? Can fantasy writing effectively express or affirm faith? How or when does it fall short of doing so? Tolkien, Lewis, and Williams are known for their Christian faith, and all three took

distinctive approaches toward expressing it (or not) in their fiction. Panelists will comment on the questions above and related issues for the work of Tolkien, Lewis, and Williams, yet discussion will go beyond these three to contemporary fantasy writers. For example, J.K. Rowling weaves many Christian symbols into her Harry Potter series while leaving them almost devoid of any over religion. Phillip Pullman's His Dark Materials trilogy expresses what some would call an anti-faith response to fantasy. Are these and other writers successful in their approach?

The 2013 publication of The Fall of Arthur complicated the generic complexities of Tolkien's work: how does Tolkien's Arthurian poem fit into the palimpsest of Arthurian legends? how does it map onto Middle-earth? How does it interact with Arthurian works by other Inklings? This panel represents The Inklings and King Arthur, an upcoming academic collection edited by Sørina Higgins. The panelists discuss Lewis, Tolkien, Williams, Barfield, Arthurian source materials, MacDonald, and Chesterton.

Since the beginning of Tolkien's popularity in the US, college teachers have developed an astounding variety of approaches to teach the mythic themes, historical backgrounds, and heroic constructs of Tolkien's Middle-earth works. While the early fellowship of Tolkien teachers inclined primarily to male, anti-establishment responses, today such colleagues include diverse types of mainstream readers, including women, honors students, and history buffs. 


