A NOTE ON THIS YEAR'S EVENT

This year, Mythcon 54 will take place in Weatherford, Oklahoma, the home of the Mythopoeic Society's archives, which are housed at Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU). Weatherford is a one-hour drive from the Will Rogers International Airport in Oklahoma City. Attendees will need to prepare to arrange for their own ground transportation between the airport and Weatherford and to travel around town during the conference. More information on transportation recommendations is provided in the "Transportation" section later in this report.

About Mythcon

The Mythopoeic Society Conference, informally known as "Mythcon," is an annual(ish) Tolkien, Inklings, and Mythopoeia-focused conference held over an extended weekend in late-July to mid-August, beginning on a Friday afternoon and concluding on the following Monday midday. The location changes for each conference.

The conference theme is always related to Inklings studies and/or fantastic and mythic literature, and both an author and scholar guest of honor are featured. Various combinations of papers, panel discussions, readings, entertainment, art shows, a dealers' room, and other activities fill the three-day event.

Another Mythcon highlight is the annual banquet, during which the annual Mythopoeic Awards are presented. A small (usually 100–200 people) size and intimate setting make Mythcon an excellent opportunity for meeting people with common interests. The Mythopoeic Society has always encouraged scholarship in mythopoeic and Inklings studies by providing a venue where new and established scholars can present their work, and which may also be considered for publication in *Mythlore*, the Society's academic journal. Financial aid to attend Mythcon may be available for scholars, and outstanding student scholars are recognized with the Alexei Kondratiev Award.

Also on tap at Mythcon are fun and some serious play: a Masquerade with prizes for everyone, Bardic Circles in the evenings for singing and poetry recitations, the annual Clerihew Contest of comic verse, and Golfimbul, a light-hearted game based on a humorous section from "The Hobbit."

About Our Theme

The Route 66 Centennial is being celebrated across Oklahoma during 2026. (Interesting fact: Oklahoma has more miles of Route 66 – 432 miles – than any other state.) As the subject of countless stories about physical and personal journeys, the iconic highway is an appropriate setting for a conference on fantasy literature, in which journeys in place and time are often central.

David R. Slayton

Author Guest of Honor

Award-winning author David R. Slayton writes fantasy stories with diverse characters he dreamed of reading but could not find as a child growing up in Guthrie, OK.

Slayton's work has twice been a finalist for the Mythopoeic Awards. His epic fantasy, *Dark Moon, Shallow Sea*, won the Science Fiction and Fantasy category at the 2024 Colorado Book Awards. In 2021, the first novel in the Adam Binder series, *White Trash Warlock*, was a finalist for the Science Fiction and Fantasy category at the Colorado Book Awards. His most prominent works include the Adam Binder series (*White Trash Warlock*, *Trailer Park Trickster*, *Deadbeat Druid*, *Redneck Revenant*), a finalist for the 2024 Mythopoeic Award for Adult Literature; *Dark Moon, Shallow Sea*, the first novel in the *Gods of Day and Night* epic fantasy series; and *Rogue Community College*, also set in the Adam Binder universe. Slayton holds degrees in history and English from Metropolitan State University in Denver, where he now resides. After a long career in computer science, he now writes full-time. Slayton's books reflect his wide range of interests, including literature, history, Dungeons and Dragons, video gaming, graphic novels, and all things fantasy and science fiction.



Dr. Joe R. Christopher

Scholar Guest of Honor

A Bartlesville, OK native, Dr. Joe R. Christopher is a two-time honoree as Mythcon Scholar Guest of Honor, having first been recognized in 1981.

Christopher is a retired English professor from Tarleton State University in Stephenville, TX, and has attended almost all Mythcons. His scholarly work on the Inklings began early in his career, including his doctoral dissertation on C. S. Lewis, "The Romances of Clive Staples Lewis," with many secondary citations. These citations, combined with Joan K. Osling's religious citations, were published as *C. S. Lewis: An Annotated Checklist of Writings About Him and His Works* (Kent State University Press, 1974). A prolific writer, he has published more than 200 scholarly essays and notes, with a significant concentration on the Inklings. He is a recipient of the Neuhouser Award for Distinguished Scholarship and Service, on June 2, 2018, at the Eleventh Frances White Ewbank Colloquium on C. S. Lewis & Friends (Taylor University, Upland, IN). Christopher is also a lifetime member of the C. S. Lewis and Inklings Society.



Mythcon 54 Theme & Call for Papers

Mythcon 54: *Get Your Fantasy Kicks on Route 66* invites proposals for papers that explore fantasy, horror, sci-fi, indigenous texts – of all genres and modes – that evoke a sense of place, of travel, of the road, of passage through landscapes, which potentially spark encounters with the uncanny, the fantastical, and the nightmarish. Themes or patterns might include:

- Lost highways
- Surprising road trips or short cuts
- Portals to the unknown
- Temporal shifts across boundaries
- A sense of the fluid experience of “the road”
- Faerie and the fay
- Indigenous or folkloric roads/passages that alter reality, consciousness, and time

Also, in keeping with the Mythopoeic Society’s archive residing near the conference at Southwestern Oklahoma State University, presentations on the role of archives in fantasy literature would be welcome. General proposals highlighting the Inklings or other works of fantasy/Mythopoeia, of course, are also always welcome, as are papers on the works and interests of our guests of honor. Papers from a variety of critical perspectives and disciplines are welcome.

Each paper will be given a 50-minute slot to allow time for questions and travel time in between sessions. Individual papers should be timed for oral presentation in 40 minutes maximum. Panels are also welcome, with the same time constraints, and both papers and panels may be presented virtually or in person.

Participants are encouraged to submit papers chosen for presentation at the conference to *Mythlore*, the refereed journal of the Mythopoeic Society. (These submissions must conform to the 9th edition of the MLA Style Manual.) Paper abstracts and panel proposals of no more than 300 words, along with contact information, whether you intend to present in-person or virtually, and A/V requirements (if any, should be sent to the Papers Coordinator (Cami Agan) at papers@mythcon.org by March 31, 2026. All presenters are expected to register for the full conference, either in-person or online, depending on their method of presentation.

Presenters who are full-time undergraduate or graduate students are encouraged to submit their completed conference papers in advance for consideration for the Alexei Kondratiev Student Paper Award. Please see www.mythsoc.org/mythcon/alexei.htm for more information.

Alexei Kondratiev Award (Student Paper)

At Mythcon 41, the Society introduced a new award for the best paper presented at Mythcon by an undergraduate or graduate student. This award was named in honor of Alexei Kondratiev, long-time Society member and a scholar of wide-ranging interests in mythopoeic and related studies, who passed away in 2010. The winner of the award receives a certificate, a one-year subscription to *Mythlore*, and a 50% discount on their registration fee for the next Mythcon they attend. The winner will be announced at the Mythcon banquet, on the Society's web site and in *Mythprint*, and is encouraged to submit their paper to *Mythlore* for publication. In order to be considered for the award, the application form must be submitted to the Alexi committee chair at mythlore@mythsoc.org by July 5th, 2026 and the finished paper must be submitted electronically by July 19th, 2026. The paper must follow *Mythlore* style guidelines and should be 4,000–8,000 words long. Applicants must be accepted in or currently enrolled in an undergraduate or graduate program at the time their abstract was submitted. Applicants must attend Mythcon and present the paper, either virtually or in person, to qualify for the award.

Glen GoodKnight Starving Scholars Fund

The Mythopoeic Society's Starving Scholars Fund was renamed in honor of our founder, Glen GoodKnight, upon his passing in November 2010. Glen always emphasized the importance of encouraging scholarship in Inklings studies and was happy to see this fund come into existence in 1993. The Fund supports attendance at Mythcon for scholars and other participants. Preference is given to persons presenting a paper or participating on a panel, though others are not automatically excluded from consideration. Awards consist of a contribution toward room & board costs or, very rarely, other conference expenses such as travel costs. The Mythcon Papers Coordinator, in consultation with the Mythopoeic Society Council of Stewards and the Conference Committee, makes the final decision as to award recipients, amounts, and application of funds. No more than half of the Fund's balance may be used in any given year. Contact papers@mythcon.org for more information.

Mythcon 54 Schedule and Programming Overview

NEW: Keynote subjects announced

The Mythcon 54 registration table will open at noon on Friday, July 24, and program items will start at 2 p.m. Friday and continue until dinner. After dinner we will have our casual meet-and-greet Welcome Reception, sponsored by the Council of Stewards. The reception will honor the Centennial of Route 66, AKA the Mother Road. Both the conference hotel and meeting place sit on Route 66, which becomes Main Street as it passes through Weatherford.

We are planning for a Hospitality Room and Bardic Circle to be available on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday nights.

On Saturday morning, July 25, the Procession and Opening Ceremonies will start at approximately 9 a.m., including our Scholar Guest of Honor address.

Saturday, July 25

Scholar Guest of Honor Address

Scholar Guest of Honor Joe R. Christopher will speak on **“The Rhetoric of the Road: The Romantic Journey as a Map of Myth, Memory, and Majesty.”**

Coinciding with the Centennial of Route 66 and the American Semicentennial, this valedictory address serves as a reflective capstone to a sixty-year career in Inklings scholarship. Framing the address as his final Mythcon appearance, the speaker invites the audience to view both personal history and speculative literature through a singular conceptual lens: the grand architecture of the Romantic Journey.

The address bridges the primary world of the American open road with the secondary worlds of the mythic imagination. It traces the speaker’s own scholarly lineage back to a formative high school bus trip to an early science fiction convention—his very first unmapped journey away from home—which served as the fertile soil for a lifelong passion for fandom and academia. This personal evolution mirrors the history of the Mythopoeic Society itself, which successfully transformed from its countercultural fan roots into a respected international academic tradition, all while fiercely preserving its original, whimsical soul.

Turning to literary analysis, the speech explores the “hidden world” archetype, demonstrating how speculative landscapes strip complex moral dilemmas of modern, real-world distractions. By examining how authors use a cozy, domestic aesthetic to mask perilous environments of moral testing, the speaker highlights the profound spiritual discoveries reserved for those willing to wander beyond the familiar.

Ultimately, this address is a celebratory defense of the mythic tradition, linking memory, landscape, and literature into a unified map, and passing the torch to a new generation to keep the scholarly lineage unbroken.

Following the morning keynote are more papers and panels throughout the day, breaking for lunch and dinner.

After-dinner entertainments will include a Masquerade and other post-programming activities.

Sunday, July 26

Author Guest of Honor Address

Author Guest of Honor David R. Slayton will speak on "**Fantasy as a Tool of Resilience and Resistance.**"

We find ourselves in a dire reality. America is facing a literacy crisis, especially among the young. College professors are sounding the alarm that students are entering higher education without having read a full novel while book bans are limiting access to reading materials. Many libraries are preemptively removing works before anyone can protest their inclusion even as budgets are being cut. Reading for pleasure among adults is down significantly, as is reading comprehension, at a time when media literacy is made crucial by weaponized misinformation, outright gaslighting, and the proliferation of AI-generated media that is becoming increasingly hard to detect as artificial. Added to this is an ongoing environmental catastrophe.

None of this is aided by the ultrawealthy, who hope to remove access to the very elements that make us human: our capacity to create art and think for ourselves. The quiet part is being said out loud: "We see a future where intelligence is a utility like electricity or water and people buy it from us on a meter." – Sam Altman, CEO of OpenAI.

In the midst of this sits fantasy literature, which, in all of its forms, including romantasy such as the books of Rebecca Yarros or comedic commentary such as Terry Pratchett's Discworld, can be part of the solution to these problems.

Authors of speculative fiction might be challenged to create realities even more threatening than our current, difficult world, but fantasy can provide escape, a reprieve. Beyond that, it can also provide a context for understanding the times we live in and give readers the means to survive them. The archetype of the fantasy hero is

one of overcoming impossible odds, or making a journey to the darkest places, and returning triumphant while perhaps shining a little light into the world along the way. This makes fantasy worth exploring and worth teaching. In it are the seeds, not only of resistance, but of resilience.

NEW: Weatherford throws out the welcome mat!

In fact, the Weatherford City Commission (at the recommendation of the Hotel-Motel Tax Committee) unanimously approved a \$4,000 grant to help pay for the conference. In addition, the City Commission also unanimously approved a city proclamation declaring July 24-27, 2026 “Get Your Fantasy Kicks on Route 66” Weekend.

Most importantly to the Mythopoeic Society, Weatherford is the location of the Society's archive, which is part of the Thomas A. Stafford Archives at Southwestern Oklahoma State University. A post-conference tour of the Archives will be scheduled. The Society's digital collection opened in 2017 and is one of the most visited sites on the SWOSU digital archive.



Also found in downtown Weatherford is a 30-foot spaceman at the corner of Main Street and Broadway Avenue. Local high schoolers convinced city leaders to nickname the statue "Major Tom," although Weatherford's favorite astronaut, Thomas P. Stafford, earned the rank of general. Who knew Generation Z was acquainted with David Bowie?

This statue was added as a Route 66 attraction here in "Space City," and is a warm tribute to Thomas P. Stafford, Weatherford native and NASA astronaut. A selfie stand is available to help you take a photo of yourself with the statue.

The famous "Earthrise" was painted on the spaceman's visor by local artist Bobby Marsee of "Marsee's Fine Art & Custom Framing" at 104 E. College Ave.

Besides the Stafford Air and Space Museum (location of the conference meetings), Weatherford is home to the [Oklahoma Heartland Museum](#). Among many other attractions there, you can stand where Elvis Presley did on April 22, 1960, in the Porter House Diner!

Weatherford has two listings in the "offbeat places" to visit on the [Roadside America web site](#). Besides Major Tom, the Wind Turbine Blade Display in Weatherford's Heritage Park made the list.

You can relax in the great outdoors (especially on a balmy Oklahoma mid-summer day!) at any of Weatherford's many parks. <https://cityofweatherford.com/parks-rec/>

If you have a car, you may also want to visit Clinton, which is about 15 miles down the road. Two major features there are the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum [Oklahoma Route 66 Museum](#) and the Clinton Indoor Water Zoo [Clinton Indoor Water Zoo](#), which, despite the name, is for people!

Last and certainly not least, as you drive to Weatherford on I-40, be sure to watch for the mounds on the south side of the highway between the Hinton exit and Weatherford (roughly mile marker 93.5). These mounds were the inspiration for H.P. Lovecraft's novella "The Mound."

Transportation: Getting to Weatherford, OK – Not as Tough as Going to Mount Doom

Weatherford, OK is accessible only to those with wheels! As we approach the event, the organizing committee will provide resources to help coordinate rides between Oklahoma City and Weatherford, and also around Weatherford during Mythcon. If you are looking for a ride to/from Mythcon from Oklahoma City or elsewhere, or may be able to provide someone else with a ride, please utilize this [ridesharing spreadsheet](#) (**NEW!**). There are two separate sheets; "Seeking Ride" and "Offering Ride." Instructions for how to complete each of them are included at the link.

Plane: Don't be turned off by flying to an airport named for Oklahoma's most beloved native son, who died in a plane crash. After arriving at Will Rogers International Airport (recently upgraded from Will Rogers World Airport!), you will need ground transportation to Weatherford. Car rental and shuttle options at OKC airport can be found [here](#). We recommend coordinating shared rides with other Mythcon attendees.

Automobile: Oklahoma City (the nearest major metropolitan area) lies at the intersection of not one!-not two!-but three! major interstate highways: east-west I-40, north-south I-35, and northeast-to-southwest I-44. Once in Oklahoma City, take I-40 west to Weatherford at Exit 84. For local transportation between the conference hotel and venue, we strongly recommend that you either have a car of your own or coordinate carpooling with another attendee.

Train: Only if you want to catch a freight train!

Bus: Only the yellow kind that serves schools.

Taxi: Weatherford does have a taxi service, the one man-one vehicle operation of Dave's Taxi. Hailing a taxi in Weatherford requires using a phone (580-819-0228).
